A number of years ago there was a television advertisement for Remembrance Day which caught my attention. It involved an interaction between some teenagers and some veterans. The conclusion of the ad was, "If you can't remember the war, remember the peace!" There was a real wisdom to the message and every Remembrance Day I treasure that message very much. None of us want memories of war, but how precious peace is for all of us.

May we be thankful for it -- and for those who sacrificed so much for it!

This is a good message for us also as Christians. Remember the peace we have as Believers in Jesus as our Saviour. Philippians 4:7 says – this is a "**peace that passes human understanding**". It is so great and keeps us and blesses us, even when life around us is collapsing. It mystifies the world, but is God's generous gift to us in Jesus.

This peace also was purchased at great cost – the death of Jesus, God's only begotten son – on the Cross to pay for our sins. In the time of trial or heartache or burdens or inner malaise, how precious this peace is. Jesus is with us (as He promises in Matthew 28:20), giving us strength and confidence and purpose and hope. We have God's peace in Jesus and in relationship with Him. We have every reason to thank God for His peace to us in Jesus.

This peace from Jesus is meant to bless us who believe (and it does), but also to make us a blessing to others. God's peace is meant to be shared. It is an equipping gift – equipping us for service, and giving us a gift to pass on to others. We share God's peace when we witness to others of Jesus as Saviour. We share it in our acts of mercy and generosity to those in need. We share it in forgiving others (friend and foe alike). The world needs Jesus' peace and we can be a blessing to many by sharing it.

Each day, ask God for openings and opportunities to share the peace of Jesus with others. Be available to be a channel of His mercy, and instrument for His witness and work. Time and again, we see and experience that – if we are available for God's use (for God's work). He will do amazing things in us and through us.

Peace! Remember the peace we have in Jesus. Thank and praise God for this great gift. And as the campfire song says, "Pass it on!"
