With those words, a leader goes looking, from the "tent of meeting" where we are gathering for lunch, back towards the dorm. Most times the "lost sheep" is found quickly, already on their way back. The "found one" is quick to show the leader their new treasure...

a very special stick discovered while meandering through the bush, now their very own prized possession (at least until it breaks)! This experience is just one of the prizes of the great adventure known as camp!

Each year some of the children who come with us from The Rock Church in Saskatoon (Website: trcyxe.ca) have never been away from home, or have never been to the lake, or have never been to camp. There are a variety of responses with some staying close to their leader while others go off excitedly veering off paths and through the trees all while whooping and hollering. No matter how they start campbold or nervous—it doesn't take long till they are roaming and feeling free on their own great adventure.

Hundreds of children and youth have come with us to camp for the last two decades. (Our first time at Elbow Bible Camp was 2012). Each year the great adventure includes hearing that Jesus loves them, and experiencing Jesus' love through the leaders and God's creation. Many respond to Jesus' love, inviting Him into their lives to be their Saviour, and starting on the path of discipleship with Jesus as their new forever friend.

In the book of Acts, Scripture tells of the great adventure that was taking place for the early church, after Jesus had ascended to the Father and the Holy Spirit came to empower His followers. We read of signs and wonders, with many people being healed, experiencing visions, and being saved. And in the midst of these amazing things taking place, there is also stress and distress that causes followers to be dispersed far and wide and out from Jerusalem.

As a result of this, we read in Acts 13, Paul is now preaching at the synagogue in Pisidian Antioch. There was great success as much of the city heard the gospel and many believed. However, the Jewish leaders became jealous and caused influential people to stir up trouble. Eventually they had Paul and Barnabas kicked out of the city. What was the response of the followers of Christ to the successes and distresses taking place in their great adventure? Acts 13:52 says, "And the disciples were filled with joy and with the Holy Spirit."

I am greatly challenged and encouraged by the disciple's actions. In the midst of opportunities and no matter what the situation was on a given day... it would seem that they were embracing the great adventure with JOY and grace. I desire to do the same.

Steven Curtis Chapman had a well- known song in the 90's (yes, thirty years ago!) entitled, "The Great Adventure"!

"Saddle up your horses, we've got a trail to blaze
Through the wild blue yonder of God's amazing grace
Let's follow our leader into the glorious unknown
This is a life like no other, whoa whoa this is the great adventure"

How do we view our journey with Jesus? Have we settled down or saddled up? Settled down to the known and safe routines and patterns of Christian living? Or saddled up for the adventure of what God might be up to, wondering where we might fit in? There is an adventure in God's kingdom where we can be his hands and feet to bring love, hope, and a message of redemption into a world that is so broken. No matter our individual journeys and callings, we are all called to live out the Great Commission and Great Commandment and this is to be our definition of the Great Adventure.

I trust that as 2022 is well under way that we will all take the opportunity to step into God's invitation to His Great Adventure... that we would view this as a fresh opportunity to use the freedom we have for the purposes of fully following Him. Thank you for allowing us to be a part of your camp family and embracing the children and youth we serve. Your openness and grace allows us to step into the great adventure of camp every summer with confidence.


