

The Great Adventure

May 26th is Ascension Day this year. It falls forty days after Easter Sunday and always falls on a Thursday. It used to be one of the great days of the Christian year, but now most of us never even notice it. There are two scriptures that talk about the Ascension of Jesus. Luke's Gospel ends with the Ascension of Jesus.

Luke 24:50-53 50: "And He (Jesus) led them out as far as Bethany, and

lifting up His hands He blessed them. 51 While He blessed them, He parted from them and was carried up into heaven. 52 And they worshiped Him and returned to Jerusalem with great joy, 53 and were continually in the temple blessing God. Then, Luke begins the book of Acts by retelling the story of the Ascension. Acts 1:9-11: "And when He had said these things, as they were looking on, He was lifted up, and a cloud took Him out of their sight. 10 And while they were gazing into heaven as He went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, 11 and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

Even though the ascension is often ignored, it is an important event in the life of Jesus for us to remember. The ascension completes Jesus' earthly mission and tells us clearly that He is enthroned as our heavenly king. Jesus has completed his Father's mission and He now rules with all authority and intercedes with all sympathy as our mediator and high priest.

The ascension of Jesus to the right hand of God the Father became very significant for me when my son Kenny was born. The day I was going to take him home from the hospital with his mother—I arrived at the hospital in time to see them loading him into an ambulance to take him to a neo-natal care unit in a bigger hospital because he was breathing too fast. The night before, I had just led a Bible Study on the Ascension texts. The study had emphasized that the One ruling the Universe is none other than the Lord Jesus Christ, who we know is fully God and fully human. The study emphasized that when Jesus ascended to the right hand of the Father, He took with him His human nature—his glorified resurrected human body. Do you realize the implications of that? There is a man ruling the Universe—one who has walked where we walked, stood where we stand, felt what we feel. I was incredibly comforted by that thought as I drove home from the hospital that night realizing—that Jesus Christ—the one ruling the universe knows what it is like to be me. He is ruling and reigning the universe and this world for the sake of His church as we are told in Ephesians.

I remind you of four significant truths about Jesus' ascension for our lives. First, remember that Jesus is presently reigning as king and remains active and engaged in our world and our lives. He knows exactly what is going on here in our world.

Secondly, you can live confidently, and strategically as servants of the exalted king of heaven. Know that your labours in the Lord Jesus are not in vain even though it sometimes seems like it from our human perspective (1 Corinthians 15:58). Think of this as you prepare for Bible Camp.

Thirdly, if you are suffering, take heart that Jesus is not indifferent to your struggle. He has endured great suffering and is thus the most merciful and sympathetic counsellor and

mediator. Take your cares to your ascended Lord who hears your prayers and can respond with all Heaven's authority.

Finally, live in hope of a glorious future. Remember what the angels said to the disciples at the ascension. "This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven." (Acts 1:11) The ascended Lord will return the same way as He left, and He will come this time as judge and king. He will abolish evil and put all God's enemies under his feet. He will end suffering and destroy death, and set up His kingdom of truth, righteousness and love. Best of all, all who believe and trust in Him as Lord and Saviour will be with our king forever. Know that you have a Lord and King who rules and reigns on your behalf and who is returning for you very soon.





Greetings from Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Outlook!

The ladies of our congregation had a wonderful afternoon at their retreat in March. Margo Linsley was the MC; Lila de Waal, Conny Behenna and Margo led worship music; and Janet Gross provided special music. Janice Bruynooghe was the guest speaker and she focused on the theme, "I Have Called You by Name" based on a reading from Isaiah. Beautifully decorated tables greeted each of the ladies and a hostess at each one guided discussion throughout the afternoon. You know ladies are having fun when there's so much laughter in the room you can't hear what anyone is saying! Bev Berntson brought a bounty of her lovely scarves and each woman was invited to take one home. If they wanted, they could give a gift which would be sent to support the work of a local aid worker in Ukraine. More than \$800 was raised! We also took some time to honour the ladies of our church who have studied and served faithfully in ladies' ministries over many decades. They were presented with flowers and thanked for the witness they have been. Lunch and a time of visiting concluded the event.



In February, our congregation voted unanimously to work toward resettling a refugee family. A committee has been working through the requirements and paperwork needed, and we have had a big focus on raising the funds needed to proceed with the project. We have been overwhelmed by the generosity of our members, other Lutheran churches who are walking

alongside, and members of the community.

A pancake supper on Ash Wednesday kicked off the fundraising, along with Easter Sunday breakfasts, a garage sale, and a Celebration of Music. All of these efforts have given us a chance to not only raise money, but also let the wider community know more about what we are doing. God has blessed these efforts tremendously. Now we await the acceptance of paperwork, budgets and case narratives as we continue to pray for the family God would have us resettle.

Our church was the venue for a Ukrainian humanitarian aid fundraiser. We host English as a Second Language (ESL) classes at our church and individuals in those classes from Ukraine were eager to do something to help the efforts of those in their homeland. They prepared a bountiful Ukrainian meal which was followed by a program. Ladies in our church made "Stand with Ukraine" ribbons that were given out to everyone in attendance. We pray for Ukraine, Afghanistan, Ethiopia and all places experiencing war, conflict, and violence.

Ephesians 4:14: "For he himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility."

We have been blessed to have speakers come and join us over the last couple of months sharing about their work. A LAMP (Lutheran Association of Missionaries and Pilots) representative, a lady who recently returned from working with refugees in Albania, workers who serve in Cameroon that our Sunday School supports, and a global worker who shared updates of the work being done in a very troubled part of the world. God is at work! We continue to pray for the spread of the Gospel.



Here are some areas where we need **YOUR** help:


