

Think About These Things

Devotional Submitted by Pastor Kevin Langager Tofield, Alberta

This summer at camp, the Bible passage that was the basis for the study I led was Philippians 4:4-9. In the last three verses we are encouraged to think on what is good and of God, and to live according to what the Apostle Paul lived and taught, that we might know the God of peace with us.

We read:

8 "Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things. **9** Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me, or seen in me—put it into practice. And the God of peace will be with you." (NIV)

Despite the fact that there is nothing that is not affected by sin in our lives and in this world, despite the fact that Satan is called the ruler of this world, and despite the fact of sickness, suffering and sorrow that touches us all, all is not lost. In fact, all has been **won** through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus that we might live by the obedience of faith and love, with eternal hope, and all peace and joy. The fact of sin and of Satan, of sickness, suffering and sorrow, does not mean that there is no good in this world. There are signs of God's goodness all around, in His creation, and in the lives of all faithful and good people. "Though the wrong seems oft so strong, God is the ruler yet." (From the hymn, "This is my Father's World.") Jesus is Lord, and He is near.

We are not to stick our heads in the sand, ignoring the sin, evil and suffering all around us. Yet, our priority is to be mindful of the good, of what is of God. Otherwise we tend to become cynical, and there is no faith, hope and love, no joy and peace in cynicism. We are to remember and recount God's acts, reminding one another of the grace and goodness of God. This is more than the power of positive thinking. It is the power of being assured of God's presence and

promises at work in and among and through His people, for the sake of this world that He loves so dearly, and for which Jesus died and was raised.

The Old Testament people of God were to recount to their children and to one another over and over again all that God had done in rescuing them from Egypt, providing for and protecting them through the 40 years in the wilderness, and bringing them into the Promised Land. They were to do this daily in their homes, week by week as they gathered to worship, and corporately as a nation every seven years.

Moses said to Israel:

"4 Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God, the Lord is one. 5 Love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength. 6 These commandments that I give you today are to be on your hearts. 7 Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. 8 Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. 9 Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates." (Deuteronomy 6:4-9 NIV)

In other words, keep God and His Word ever before you and your families. "For the LORD is good and His love endures forever; His faithfulness continues through all generations." (Psalm 100:5)

It was a great encouragement for me to be at camp this year, to see children and grandchildren, parents and grandparents acknowledging God's goodness and love across the generations. Thank you for this example, and for your reverence for the Word of God. Keep Jesus ever before you, in your hearts through faith. Continue to impress Him to your children. Talk about Him and to Him wherever you go, in whatever you are doing, morning, noon and night. The truth and love of God's Word in Christ will become ever more apparent the more you listen to, learn of, and live by Him; and the God of peace will be with you.

If I think only of myself and my own condition, and my own day's doings, and my day's record of service, then I can find no peace. Therefore, O Father, let me think rather of You and rejoice that Your love is great enough to blot out all my sin. And, O Christ, the Lamb of God, let me think of You, and lean upon Your heavenly righteousness... what You are for me and in my stead. And Holy Spirit, think within me, and so move within my mind and will that as the days go by I may be more and more conformed to the righteousness of Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever. Amen. (From John Baillee's Diary of Private Prayer)




July:
