

Does GOD Let Bad Things Happen to Good People at Christmas Time?

"I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all people... A SAVIOR has been born to you: He is CHRIST the LORD." Luke 2:10-11

Praise the LORD He is giving us another Advent and Christmas to celebrate His first coming 2000 years ago and the promise of His soon return. Amen, come LORD JESUS.

All over the world His people will be celebrating and worshipping our LORD JESUS and thousands will be coming to know Him as their SAVIOUR during these coming weeks. Our hearts are filled with overflowing joy and praise as we contemplate His amazing goodness and mercy to us. Tragically, however, there is also much evil and suffering that will come into many people's lives during these same weeks. Temptations to sin of every kind, accidents, diseases, wars, etc. will impact many people in the upcoming days, including many of our own lives. When that happens, many will ask "Why does GOD allow bad things to happen to good people?" Some will go beyond the question to accuse GOD of being unjust and responsible for all of this evil. Instead of celebration there will be mourning and anger.

Does GOD let bad things happen to good people? Who are the "good people"? The concept of "good people" comes straight from the false teachings of secular humanists, who believe that all people are basically good. However, as GOD'S SPIRIT teaches us in His Word, the exact opposite is true. "There is no one righteous, not even one...there is no one who does good, not even one" (Romans 3: 10,12). JESUS, GOD'S SON said: "No one is good-- except GOD alone" (Mark 10:18). If we were like GOD and could read everyone's mind and know what everyone says and does in their private lives, we would more fully realize the truth that, "there is no difference, for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of GOD" (Romans 3:23). If we think that we are good, without sin, "we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us" (1 John 1:8).

What are "bad things"? There is a story that goes something like this: One day a man gave his son a horse. The man's neighbours said, "That's sure good news about your son getting his own horse." The man answered, "Good news? Bad news? Who knows?" The next day when his son was out riding, the horse threw him and broke his leg. The neighbours said: "That's sure bad news about your son's broken leg." "Good news? Bad news? Bad news? Bad news? Who knows?"

Is suffering bad? Is death bad? The LORD wept over suffering and death in our world (Genesis 6:6; Luke 19:41; John 11:35). Nevertheless, He allows us, all of us, without exception, to suffer and die for His good eternal purpose for our life. "The wages of sin is death, but the gift of GOD is eternal life in CHRIST JESUS our LORD." (Romans 6:23). Praise Him that in His mercy and grace through JESUS, to everyone who turns to GOD in repentance and faith, often in times of suffering and need, the LORD promises forgiveness for our sin and "that everything will work out for the good for those who love Him and are called according to His purpose" (Romans 8:28).

For all of us who trust in the LORD: "we rejoice in the hope of the glory of GOD. Not only so, but we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance, character; and character, hope. And hope does not disappoint us, because GOD has poured out His love into our hearts by the HOLY SPIRIT, Whom He has given us." Romans 5:2-5

For the individual who truly believes in and loves the LORD JESUS, the sting of suffering and death is only a border crossing from the sufferings of this life to the experience of the abundant eternal life in the glorious presence of GOD, our Creator and Saviour.

There really is only one true example in all of history of something bad happening to someone who is truly good in every way. His name is JESUS CHRIST! GOD turned His SON'S suffering and death at the hands of our fallen degenerate human race into forgiveness, peace, and eternal life for all who believe.

The only really good news of great joy in our world is that JESUS was willing to enter our world and sacrifice His own body and blood on the cross in order to forgive every sinner who repents and trusts in His amazing grace. One day very soon He is coming back for all who love Him to take us into our eternal home where there is no more sin, evil, suffering and death, but only the experience of abundant life in His glorious presence. As the song says: "Rejoice! and again I say Rejoice!"

Greetings from Skudesnes Lutheran Church!

Harvest is finished, the season of gathering in the fruits of the earth is passed, and our world is swathed in white. After a dry year, we welcome the snow, just as we were grateful for the fine fall days.

Earlier this fall we were reminded to be grateful for something we often take for granted: the peace and safety of our communities. A calm September weekend was shattered by alerts, as everyone across the province was warned to lock doors, and those at Weldon and the James Smith Cree Nation were told to "shelter in place." The perpetrator of a series of knife attacks was at large. One of the victims was a former parishioner of Pastor Sonje, Wes Peterson, "a good, kind man." Pastor Sonje Finnestad touched our hearts that Sunday (as she so often does) with her message, reminding us that such terrible days are a small part of a much larger story – a story of exploitation and injustice – and that even during this tragedy there were many acts of love and forgiveness. There is no place so dark that God's love does not reach.

As individuals or a congregation, we are blessed to be able to help Pakistan flood victims or Haitian refugees or those in need in our own country.

The golden days of October brought Thanksgiving and many young folks "home" to share a joyous celebration of good food, fall colors, garden produce, and family.

On October 30th there was no service at Skudesnes as we joined worship with Redeemer in Davidson. The following Sunday, November 6th, morning worship had to be cancelled as winter made a sneaky early entrance with freezing rain and snow, bringing treacherous driving conditions.

Pastor Sonje took the final week of her holidays in late November, and in her absence, Maxine Follick brought the message on November 20th – the last Sunday

before Advent, Christ the King Sunday. Maxine led us on a journey looking back on how God has led and guided us all year.

On November 13th, "Take Five" (Carol Dieno, Doris Stamnes, Donna Russel, and Alf Richardson) presented an evening of Gospel music at Redeemer. On November 20th, Larry Krause presented a cowboy campfire evening of gospel and Christmas music at Skudesnes, with the offering going to the local food bank.

Skudesnes Church council met on October 27th, and again on November 21st. Often the questions dealt with are earthly (e.g. how to get the cistern cleaned out?) but the answers are invariably divine. We thank God for those willing hands, clever minds, and kind hearts that keep our congregation going.


